Subject to the prevailing Covid-19 constraints we will be running the 79th annual <u>Fareham Music Festival</u> between Friday 3rd May and Sunday 5th May, 2024 at West Hill Park School in Titchfield. If you have not visited us before I would like to take this opportunity of explaining what we do and inviting you to enter students to the festival.

Fareham Music Festival (like the other 300+ Festivals affiliated to the <u>British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance & Speech</u>) is a charitable organisation run entirely by volunteers. The Federation is dedicated to providing a platform for people of all ages interested in the performing arts. We organise a weekend of music-making in Fareham with the benefit of constructive criticism from experienced adjudicators. Despite its competitive nature, we pride ourselves on creating a friendly atmosphere for all our visitors. Our adjudicators for 2024 will be Sarah Jefferies (for choral & vocal) and Bryan Husband (for piano & instrumental).

The Festival Committee seeks to work in partnership with parents, guardians and teachers and endeavours to provide, as far as is practicable, a safe and secure environment for all participants. If you are entering competitors who are children or vulnerable adults, please draw the attention of their parents/guardians/carers to our Safeguarding Policy (in the Syllabus and on our website), and remind them that they are responsible for the safety of their children and should accompany and supervise them throughout the Festival.

ADJUDICATORS

Bryan Husband GRSM ADWCMD FISM



Life as a singer, actor, teacher, music examiner, adjudicator and ski instructor is what keeps Bryan challenged, solvent, and amused. He has performed in Opera, Musicals, Oratorio, and concerts around the UK and abroad, and made many appearances on tv, radio, and recordings. He feels privileged to be a tenor amongst tenors, having sung with Luciano Pavarotti, Placido Domingo, Andrea Bocelli, Russell Watson, Roberto Alagna and Josh Groban, to namedrop a few. He trained at the Royal College of Music, London, and the Welch College of Music, London, and

He trained at the Royal College of Music, London, and the Welsh College of Music and Drama, Cardiff. Recent performances have been in Malvern, Worcester, London, and Bergen. After time spent performing abroad, he moved to Guildford, where he held for some years the posts of Head of Singing at Guildford School of Acting, and Lay-Clerk at Guildford Cathedral (each day from Bernstein to Bach in a few minutes). He now works as a freelance performer, tutor at Trinity Laban Conservatoire, examiner, and adjudicator, and is fortunate enough to

divide his time between homes in London and Worcester.

In all aspects of his work, he is most interested in the connection between text (its meaning and articulation) and voice (speech or song); he believes that a vocal technique is 'merely' a means of expressing text and sharing it with an audience.

Adjudication has taken him to Hong Kong, Trinidad and Tobago, Gibraltar, Guernsey, most recently Jersey, and all around the UK and Ireland. His experience of the festival movement outside adjudication began later than for many; he was a post-graduate student when he first entered one and was then 'employed' as accompanist in another. However, he has since encouraged students to enter festivals at all levels of development, and in all styles and genres, believing strongly that the 'purpose' of the movement is vital for performers – the platform of a safe, supportive, and constructive environment in which to practise and develop one's artistic and performer persona. He simply yearns to be out there, meeting and hearing performers of all ages again in his role as specialist or generalist adjudicator.

Sarah Jefferies LRAM, ARCM



Sarah is a vocal graduate of the Royal Academy of Music, where she studied with Josephine Veasey and Patricia Clarke. Whilst at the Academy, Sarah was the recipient of many prizes including Early Music, Lieder, and English Song. She was an active member of the opera course, singing roles by Britten, Strauss, and Mozart.

Upon leaving the Academy, Sarah studied with Margreet Honig and Elly Ameling at the Sweelinck Conservatorium in Amsterdam. She has sung recitals and oratorios all over the Europe and was a member of the Opera De Lyon, with whom she recorded many works including Schoenberg's 'Moses und Aron' and Orf's 'Carmina Burana'.

Sarah is a visiting teacher of voice at Marlborough College in Wiltshire and has adjudicated all over the UK and the Middle East, as well as at some of the major conservatoires in the U.K.

Sarah has a real fascination for the workings of the human voice and enjoys helping her students of all ages and standards to improve their vocal abilities.

ACCOMPANISTS

Entrants are advised that Fareham Music Festival does not employ official accompanists. It is the responsibility of entrants who require an accompanist to engage their own in good time before the Festival. You may need to pay a fee for the accompanying of your Festival performance and for any rehearsals you may arrange. Payment is a matter between the accompanist and the performer. Accompanist fees are not set by the Fareham Music Festival. Please indicate the name of your accompanist on the entry form to assist in the scheduling of classes.

No one will be allowed to enter during a performance or adjudication, as this is both discourteous and distracting.

Bad language will not be tolerated at any age. Adjudicators have recommended (particularly for junior competitors) that:

- (1) Competitors should dress appropriately for their Song and Character,
- (2) Any lyrics should be suited to the age of the competitor.

WHO MAY ENTER?

- 1. The Festival is open to everyone, however,
 - Certain classes have age restrictions.
 - Professionals, as defined in rule 2, may only enter classes designated as "Open". Amateur status cannot be held by someone who is, or who has been, paid to perform in the discipline in which they seek to enter the Festival.
 - The Committee reserves the right to refuse an entry without assigning a reason.
- 2. A professional is defined as a person whose principal means of livelihood is obtained by performing and/or teaching in the discipline involved. This rule does not apply to conductors.
- 3. The age of an entrant for Festival classes will be their age as at the entry closing date. Should there be any doubt about an entrant's age in the junior classes the Committee reserves the right to see proof of age.
- 4. No one below the age of 18 may enter any adult class.
- 5. Entrants may perform once only in each class, except in family ensemble classes provided that a different part is taken.
- 6. Entrants in any family ensemble must have been bona fide members of that ensemble for two months prior to the date of performance. **Conductors may not sing with their choirs**.
- 7. When more than one item is performed by an ensemble, membership of that ensemble must be the same for each item.

HOW TO ENTER

- 8. Entry forms must be completed in full and sent with entry fees to the address indicated on the form, to arrive by 16th March 2024.
- 9. "Own Choice" pieces must be identified, and their running times given on the entry form. Entries will not be accepted if this is not done. Changes in "Own choice" pieces cannot be accepted after 6 weeks preceding the Festival.
- 10. Entry fees cannot be returned except for entries not accepted by the decision of the Committee, or as otherwise provided for in these Rules.

CLOSING DATE FOR ENTRIES

- 11. The closing date for entries is 16th March 2024. Entries will be treated on a first come, first served basis if it is necessary to limit the number of entries then the Committee reserves the right to stop accepting entries.
 - NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.

EXAM CLASSES

12. These are confined to current Associated Board or Trinity grade pieces. Competitors should provide the Adjudicator with a copy of the music.

OWN CHOICE PIECES

13. COMPETITORS MUST PROVIDE THE ADJUDICATOR WITH THE MUSIC THEY WILL BE PERFORMING. This can be a photocopy, see Rule 15. Failure to provide the Adjudicator with a copy of the music you will be performing will result in disqualification.

PHOTOCOPIED MUSIC

- 14. The Festival cannot legally allow anyone to play or perform from photocopied music & has no choice but to disqualify performers and accompanists who do so unless, before their class starts, they produce written evidence showing that the publisher's agreement has been sought and given. The only copies the Festival can legally allow are:
 - Copies for the Adjudicator's use which will be destroyed at the end of the class,
 - Copies for an awkward page turn which may hinder the performance.
 - Legal downloads

ORGANISATION

- 15. The Committee reserves the right to limit, cancel or subdivide any class or classes.
- 16. The Committee reserves the right without notice to engage additional adjudicators, to provide a substitute for any adjudicator unable to appear, or to transfer classes from one session to another.

ACCOMPANISTS

17. **An original printed copy of music must be available in the performance room.** Photocopies are acceptable providing an original is available in the performance room, with the entrant's name and class clearly written on the first page, together with any metronome marking, indications of interpretation and duration of the piece.

PERFORMANCE

- 18. Entrants are expected to perform in the order in which they are listed in the programme. Alterations will be made only at the discretion of the Committee.
- 19. Any entrant not present when called will be heard only at the discretion of the Adjudicator and may not be assigned a category or qualify for an award.
- 20. Performers who need to discuss anything with the Accompanist immediately before their performance should do so while the Adjudicator is completing the assessment of the previous performer, so as to be ready to start when called.
- 21. Entrants are expected to perform without prompting or guidance from the audience, unless by prior agreement with the Festival organisers and Adjudicator. Failure to observe this rule may lead to disqualification.
- 22. Entrants should not play repeats in exam pieces, except "da capo" repeats. In own choice pieces, repeats are optional, provided that the time limits specified are adhered to.
- 23. Where time limits are shown for a class, these must be strictly observed. The time of a performance will be from the first note/word played/sung/spoken to the last note/word played/sung/spoken (excluding tuning). A performance that is too long may be commented upon by the Adjudicator, but will not be assigned a category, nor be eligible for an award. In the case of a recital class, a performance should not be less than the minimum time limit.
- 24. Photography, audio or video recording during performances or adjudication is not allowed by the Festival.

ADJUDICATION

- 25. The Adjudicator's decision is final.
- 26. No one, except Committee Members or Stewards in the course of their duties, may discuss any aspect of the Festival with an Adjudicator before, during, or after classes, except at the invitation of the Adjudicator.
- 27. Adjudications and certificates will be available from the designated table as soon as possible after each class (or class group in the case of joint adjudications).

MARKING SCHEME

28. The Adjudicator will assign one of the following categories to each performance entitled to an adjudication:

CATEGORY	or	MARK	<u>DESCRIPTION</u>
Satisfactory	or	75-77	A performance that needs encouragement.
Credit	or	78-80	A performance showing a fair standard of general presentation.
Merit	or	81-83	A good performance, generally well prepared and showing some artistic merit.
Commended	or	84-86	A very good performance technically and artistically.
Distinction	or	87-89	An excellent performance.
Honours	or	90+	An outstanding performance.

TROPHIES

- 29. Not all classes will carry a trophy allocation is at the discretion of the Committee.
- 30. Trophies or other awards will not normally be awarded unless a Commended, Distinction or Honours category is achieved. However, the awarding of a trophy or other award is solely at the discretion of the Adjudicator.
- 31. Trophy winners may have their name and the Festival year inscribed on their trophy, at their own expense, if they wish, so long as the style is consistent with existing inscriptions.
- 32. All trophies awarded at a Festival must be cleaned and returned in good condition to the Trophy Secretary by 1st March 2024.
- 33. If a trophy is lost/damaged or not returned on time the Committee reserves the right to:
 - charge the recipient for repair or replacement,
 - withhold presentation of further trophies to the recipient and/or school.

GENERAL

34. The Committee cannot accept responsibility for property, including instruments and music, left at the Festival venue.

CREATING SAFER FESTIVALS FOR EVERYONE

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to create **Safer Festivals for Everyone:**

- 1. A single, definitive **Safeguarding Policy** adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. A single, definitive **Equal Opportunities Policy** adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 3. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO's) appointed for each Federation Festival. Fareham Music Festival FSO's Position is Vacant, the post will be covered by the Venue Organiser, Mr Peter Humphreys (DBS checked) until the post is filled.
- 4. Best practice advice in the form of **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection leaflets**, with support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers. Including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 5. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new Festival staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending / performing at a Federation Festival.
- 6. All Festival volunteers wear a Festival badge. All teachers/parents/guardians /carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection** best practice advice. In addition, we will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 7. For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, practice and changing areas that may be provided.
- 8. No unauthorised photography, audio or video recording of children and young people is allowed at our Festivals. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child is not included in official photos.
- 9. Some children and vulnerable adults may have specific needs in order to take part. If this is the case, we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Festival prior to arrival. The Festival actively seeks wherever possible to meet these needs but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 10. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone is published explicitly in our Syllabus, Programme and on our website. By completing and signing the entry form all parents / guardians / carers and teachers of entrants under 18 confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.

SAFEGUARDING POLICY

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech (BIFF) work for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind.

We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students, or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals. It has been drawn up on the basis of relevant law and guidance that seeks to protect children and young people, and its purpose is to set out the overarching principles that guide our approach.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation, or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers, and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to, and respecting them
- appointing a Federation Head of Safeguarding and, for each festival, at least one Festival Safeguarding Officer
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- working within the legislation and guidance that specifically addresses the needs of young performers (specifically, the Children and Young People Acts 1933 and 1963, and the Children (Performance and Activities) (England) Regulations 2014
- adopting a safe and balanced approach to the issue of creating and using photography and images of children and young people at our festivals and in our communications
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff, and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support, and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year NSPCC guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.

VOCAL SYLLABUS

- No voice amplification is permitted in any vocal class.
- Backing tracks are permitted for the following classes only:

 - Songs from the Shows: V10, V11, V12 and V20

but it is recommended that a pianist/accompanist be engaged to create a better performance.

- If a backing track is used, please note that:
 - o competitor must provide their own playback equipment, which should have a current PAT test certificate,
 - o the track must not include any singing,
 - o any intro/close in the track is to be included in the class time limit.
- There will be no exception to rule 15 for any class, i.e., the adjudicator must be provided with a copy of the printed music.

JUNIOR VOICE: note that material must be suited to the age of junior singers.

Adjudicators have noted that Junior vocals would benefit from a spoken introduction.
